Limestone

and gold found in these hills

Besides being one of the busiest towns in Butte County, it was once the home of some of the world's best limestone.

That's what Florence Styles told members of Paradise Genealogical Society about Nelson Bar - where gold and chrome mining also thrived.

Using photographs and copies of other documents, Mrs. Styles discussed the construction of the covered bridge by Lake Oroville, some 26 years later.

Some of the historians' information was obtained from Frank and Eva Parks, she said. Mrs. Parks is the granddaughter of Charles Curtis, the first man to settle Nelson Bar.

He also started the first ferry boat operation that crossed that section of the West Branch of the Feather River, Mrs. Styles explained.

In other matters, the society announced plans for its 10th anniversary celebration with a genealogical show at the recreation center April 2 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Displays will be highlighted with pictures, documents and family records of members.

Guests at the January meeting were John and Irene Johnston, who have been traveling and researching their family history in Iowa and the Midwest.

Bob Jackson of Oroville donated a book he wrote to the society entitled "The Family of William and Abigail Jackson, 1760-1974." It's the story of his family history.

The society's next meeting will be held Wednesday, Feb. 8, at the Allstate Savings and Loan Association at 7:30 p.m.


What was going on here 150 years ago, April, May & June 1871?

BRIDGE MATTERS.-The Board of Supervisors have been in session since Tuesday, engaged most of the time on matters connected with the construction of a free bridge across Feather river at this place. The plan for the bridge adopted by the Board, is the Smith Patent Truss, presented by the Pacific Bridge Company, of Oakland, to whom the contract was let for constructing the same, for the sum of \$18,000. The bridge is to be completed on or before the 15th of August next. Of this sum, the county has appropriated \$8,000, and the Committee appointed by the citizens have given the Board of Supervisors a bond to pay the remaining \$10,000. of the contract price, from the subscriptions signed for that purpose. 

Mr. Clifton Charles Mickelson, former Butte County Administrative Officer



Clifton Mickelson passed away on Monday, November 30, 2020 in Fresno California at the age of 95. A World War II Veteran, he was the son of Clifton C. Mickelson and Margaret Josephine (Day) Mickelson and was born on November 28, 1925 in Leavenworth Kansas.

Clifton worked in the private sector managing Western Auto and Gamble stores before being hired in 1958 as the Butte County Assistant Administrative Officer.

Then in 1967 he was hired as the Butte County Administrative Officer, moving the County forward into the computer age and overseeing the completion of the County Administrative Offices in Thermalito which bear his name. After serving the people of Butte County, Clifton retired to travel the

world and spend time with his children and grandchildren. Preceded in death by his daughter Mary Frances Trover, Mr. Mickelson is survived by his wife, Jane Mickelson, sons Clifton and Erick Mickelson, daughters Catherine Moseley, Martha

Mickelson, and Laura Zeimke and their spouses and 12 grandchildren and 7 great-grandchildren. Interment will be at the Chico Memorial Mausoleum.
