Building Committee up-date: 9-23-2021

We have reached the point of having the roughed-in electrical for both the front and rear of the building worked on to be followed by the wall and ceiling insulation after the electrical permit is signed-off. Some clean-up carpentry for incoming dry-wall work will be required. Hopefully dry-walling will start near the beginning of the last week in October.

The building was modified in the north end to accommodate the location of the AC/Heat split. This required the removal of the east-side transom window, also the west side transom window was removed to provide for more usage space in the galley area.


PGS Issues to pursue:
